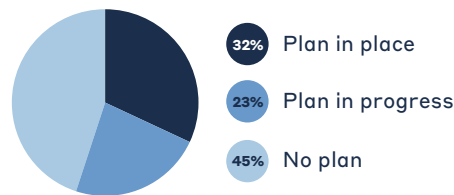

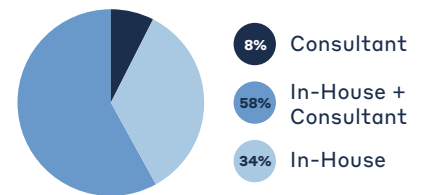


## Snapshot of data collected in the 2020 GMI

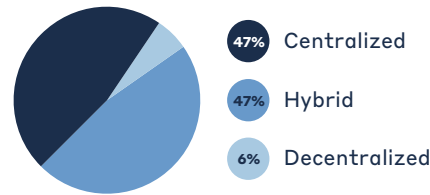
GIS Strategic Planning



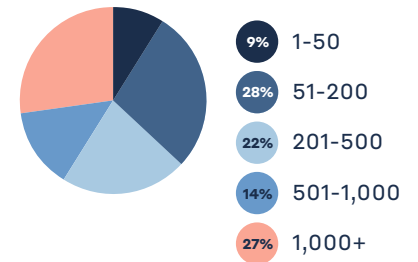
GIS Plan Developed in House vs Consultant
